
Student Announcing our 2025 **Student Council:** Congratulations to

Recently I have been reading an interesting book about anxiety in children. There are many reasons that this could be on the increase, and in the book, there are many pearls of wisdom. One I am sharing today is:

## Many of us are 'over protecting' our children in the real world while 'under protecting' them online.

To me, this could mean that we know, do and say a lot about physical safety e.g. wear your helmet, slow down, don't climb too high, be careful... but what do we know, do or say about what they might (often innocently) be exposed to online? Children's brains are being wired to learn to cope with the stresses of everyday living. They need some elements of physical risk to learn


to cope, such as falling over when they are learning to walk. Online risks on the other hand can confuse the brain and upset the wiring. Children can become addicted very quickly to online experiences, they can see things that their brains are just not ready for, and this causes confusion, worry and sometimes shame. They do not have the communication skills to cope, and over time brains can be wired so that online lives become normalised. Please consider the quote above about 'under protecting' your children when online. If anyone is ever interested in reading this book, please let me know! Ali




